Ground rules and regulations

The following ground rules and regulations have been established so that all campers can enjoy their stay and so that we can provide a safe and fun environment for everyone.

1. Registered Guests Agree to Indemnify and hold Fish Tale owners and employees harmless from any liability for personal injury, property damage, loss or theft of personal property sustained by other guests on the grounds or visitors invited on site.

2. Vehicles

- One vehicle permitted per site unless otherwise arranged.
- There are designated areas for your boat trailers so please confirm with owners or staff where you should park yours.
- No ATVs or motorcycles permitted on the grounds unless used for transportation in and out of the park.

3. Trees and Natural Environment

- Defacing of the natural environment (rocks, trees, etc.) on Park property is **prohibited**.
- No climbing, no cutting, no trimming and no nailing or tying anything to trees. This includes clotheslines.
- If you notice dead trees and are afraid it may fall on your car or cause injury, please advise us and we will take care of it as soon as we can or, if deemed necessary, as soon as a professional can come on site.

4. NO Outside Firewood is Permitted. The *Canadian Food Inspection Agency* strongly advises that firewood should be bought locally in order to prevent the spread of pests. Fish Tale staff and Owners will be happy to sell you wood. You will be asked to remove your wood if you bring it in without approval.

5. Please ensure a responsible person tends the fire until extinguished.

- Please douse with water to ensure it's completely extinguished by using a hose or a bucket.
- Keep the fire at least two (2) meters from flammable materials.
- No bonfires. Please keep flames less than two (2) feet in height.
- Designated fire pits cannot be moved without camp Owners' approval.
- All fire bans must be respected and will be posted at the entrance.

6. Fire Pits

If you are emptying your fire pit, **please** do not dump ashes in the ditches or forest, make sure the ashes are cold to the touch and **only** discard the ashes in the **red steel drum** labelled "**ASHES**". If bin is full, please advise Owners so it can be emptied.

7. Visitors

- All campers are responsible for their visitors.
- Everyone entering the property **must** stop and register at the office.
- Day visitors to sites are subject to a **\$7 +HST** charge per person and must leave by 11PM.
- Visitors to cabins who stay overnight are subject to a **\$30 +HST** charge during spring/fall and a **\$35 +HST** charge during the summer months and must leave by 11AM the next day.
- There is no charge for visitors aged 7 and under.
- No visitors are permitted to arrive after 11PM unless arrangements are made ahead of time.

8. Children

- Any person under the age of eighteen (18) must be always accompanied by an adult.
- Please ensure that your children stay safe and are in a responsible environment.
- Please don't let children run or ride their bicycles between trailers and cottages.
- Please do not let children play on or near the docks, the boats or the pool.

9. Pets

- Dogs and cats are permitted in the park.
- Maximum of two (2) pets per lot unless otherwise approved.
- They must be always leashed when outdoors and should **never** be left unattended outside or in the cabins.
- No ground tie-downs permitted as they pose a trip hazard.
- Please scoop their poop and dispose in blue garbage bin near the garage.
- Visiting pets are permitted; the same rules apply.
- To avoid complaints about barking dogs, please be diligent and keep your pets quiet for the respect of others. This privilege could be revoked if barking persists.

10. **Under the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, 2017**, you cannot smoke or vape in any enclosed workplace, any enclosed public place or other places designated as smoke-free and vape-free.

On Fish Tale property, this includes but is not limited to:

- > Public washrooms
- > Public showers
- > Rented cabins
- > Fenced pool area
- > Public gatherings under the tent
- > Office entrance and patio
- > Children's play area, **even if children aren't present**

11. Cannabis

- The Occupants shall not cultivate, produce or distribute cannabis anywhere on Park lands, the Site, or in the Occupants' trailer.
- Lawful smoking & consumption of cannabis is permitted on the **Occupants' site only** and is **prohibited** in all common areas of the park.

- In the event that consumption or smoking of cannabis on the Site is the subject of valid nuisance complaints by other Occupants or Visitors, as determined solely by the Owners, the Owners may further restrict such on Site consumption or smoking as deemed by the Owner to be appropriate.

12. Alcoholic Beverages are not to be in evidence at any time if walking around the grounds. Let's all remember that this is a family campground.

13. Drinking and Driving on the Grounds Will Not be Tolerated and will result in an immediate eviction from the campground without a refund. If you're impaired by alcohol or any other substance, please walk back to your site.

14. Fireworks and Firearms are strictly prohibited. This includes pellet and BB guns.

15. Quiet Time is between 11PM and 8AM. This means no music, loud talking, loud laughing, barking or noise of any kind that may disturb your neighbours.

16. Public Showers and Restrooms

- No Smoking or vaping of any kind inside the building.
- Pets are not permitted in the building.

17. Swimming Pool and Dock Area

- There are no lifeguards on duty, swim at your own risk.
- Parents and/or guardians are responsible for children near water and must ensure that they are being always supervised.
- Please no disposable diapers in the pool; swim diapers must be used.
- Suntan oil, glass containers, aluminum cans and food are not allowed inside the pool fence.
- **Plastic bottles or plastic cups are the only containers permitted.**

18. Household Garbage must be in a tied plastic bag and disposed in designated containers. This service is limited to household waste and each camper is responsible for keeping their site clean. **Disposing of anything in the forested areas of our property will result in an eviction without refund.**

19. Be Courteous and Respectful to Your Neighbours.

- Please follow only designated roads or walkways and do not cut through occupied sites.
- Each camper undertakes to keep their own site clean and free of clutter.
- Any disrespect to staff or fellow campers can result in your eviction and no refund will be issued.

20. Management reserves the right to evict any person(s) without refund for infractions of the above rules or if any law is broken on the property.

While staying with us, you have direct access to the Wolseley River which flows north westerly from our docks for about 6 kilometres. Furthermore, you can also enjoy more than 25kms of the French River, through Wolseley Bay. This stretch of water is safely navigable by motorboat and canoe; it has about 220 km of shoreline.

There are 77 islands and innumerable weed beds and rocky shoals. It has approximately 2,300 ha (5,680 acres) of open water to fish and explore. Some places are over 36 m (120 ft.) deep. It's all yours to discover.

The Wolseley Bay Area of the French River is contained upstream by the Fiver Fingers Rapids, the Chaudière Channel, the Portage Channel and the Restoule River, and downstream by Cedar Rapids, Little Pine Rapids and Rainy Rapids. All these rapids are worth to be explored to catch their unique characteristics.

The Centre offers local tourist information and a wide variety of specially selected sales items at the Ontario Parks store.

For the hikers!

- **Chaudière and Tikibi Trails:** Located at Dokis First Nation. These trails are connected by a series of looping trails. Interpretive signs along the way describe the local plants and history. Stroll along the famous Chaudière Dams and discover the upper and lower French River's wilderness, rapids, and wild scenery. Small user fee applies. Guided tours are available.

Find it: From the HWY 11/17 junction near Seymour Street, take HWY 17 west for 56 km (34.8 mi). Turn left at HWY 64, and travel for 39.5 km (24.5 mi) until you reach Dokis Reserve Road. Turn left and follow the road for about 26 km (16 mi) until you reach Dokis.

- **French River Provincial Park:** This trail begins at the Visitor Centre and follows the edge of the French River Gorge and ends at the historic Recollet Falls. (4km moderate) The short portage around the falls has been walked by generations of First Nations, famous explorers, hardy Voyageurs, fur traders and missionaries.

➤ **Grundy Lake Provincial Park:**

– **Swan Lake Trail – 1.5 km loop (1 hour) moderate to difficult.**

Wind through a special area in the park which is protected as a nature reserve. This short hike crosses rocky ridges and lookouts as well as a variety of interesting wetlands. The centerpiece of the trail includes a boardwalk, where wetland plants and animals can be studied. While there, be sure to watch for the Great Blue Heron, beaver, waterfowl, bitterns and other varieties of birds, reptiles, amphibians, fish, deer, moose and carnivorous plants.

– **Gut Lake Trail – 2.5 km (1 ½ hours) moderate to difficult.**

For some, this is the most popular trail in the park. It travels by two different areas: the rugged rock of the Precambrian Shield (which supports most of the life in this area), and the lakes, streams and wetlands (which drain excess water into Georgian Bay). There are many points that are ideal for photos, rest stops or a picnic. If you walk quietly, you may see Great Blue Heron, other birds, amphibians, fox, deer and moose.

– **Beaver Dams Trail – 3.6 km (2.5 hours), moderate to difficult.**

This trail passes through dense forest and wetlands. Moose, deer, fisher, grouse and many other species of birds and mammals may be seen. The highlight of the trail is the Great Blue Heron rookery, identified as large bunches of branches at the tops of swamp-killed trees. In the spring, a few of these nests are active so bring your binoculars! Finally, you will also see a dammed rock fracture which controls the water level of Bucke Lake and affects Grundy and Gut Lakes as well as Nisbet Creek. Beavers are amazing engineers!

- **Mashkinonje Provincial Park:** The wonders of Mashkinonje are best known by field naturalists from North Bay and Sudbury; and botany and nature-based tourism students from the local colleges and university. Mashkinonje Provincial Park consists of a diverse system of wetlands supporting all the major wetland types; marshes, bogs, swamps, fens and ponds; interspersed with undulating granite ridges that cover over 2000 hectares along the West Arm of Lake Nipissing. The park counts among its many wetlands two provincially significant areas the Loudon Basin Peatlands and the Muskrat Creek complexes.

The parks features are the result of a post-glacial lake that covered the area combined with a series of parallel low elevation folded bedrock uplands. The low upland bedrock areas were wave washed with soils eroded and deposited in the depressions. The amount of soil deposited determines if the depressions are nutrient rich or nutrient poor. The broken drainage also has a range of moisture levels from wet to dry. Add to moisture and nutrient variability- wave action on Lake Nipissing and aspect (south vs. north facing slopes) and the result are a variety of wetlands habitats that make Mashkinonje a remarkably interesting location to observe nature. A combined group of community and educational partners have developed a system of **9 different hiking trails from 0.3 to 5.4 km** in the park to make the park features available to the public.

- **Pine Grove Nature Trails:** These trails offer an easy, peaceful walk through a mixed forest which is dominated by maple and other upland hardwood species. A few interpretive signs are found along the trail which talk about the various species of trees located in the area. Situated close to the Pickerel River, the property is a part of a historically significant area, replete with native culture, as well as evidence of early European settlements and logging practices which can still be seen today. Navigating the trails themselves is not difficult as most intersections are signed with arrow markers indicating the trail's eventual destination.

Tourist Attractions in Sturgeon Falls

Sturgeon River House Museum: The Museum hosts a variety of events throughout the year with activities planned for all of Mother Nature's four seasons. Whether you are a winter enthusiast or you prefer the soft breeze of a beautiful summer's day, you will certainly enjoy your time spent at the museum. Their events are without a doubt a great way to spend a day exploring new grounds and learning new facts on local history and that of the Hudson Bay Company.

To reach the falls from North Bay head west on Hwy 17 for a couple of kilometers. There is a small roadside park on the north side of the road. This is located just east of where Hwy 17 and 17B meet. The road size park has a paved parking lot. Well defined trails lead to the falls. There is even a stairway to take you to the top if you do not feel like clambering on the rocks.

Kivi Park: Kivi Park is a unique not for profit offering over 480 acres of land to be explored and enjoyed in Greater Sudbury. It is filled with all the biodiversity the Boreal Forest is known for and some of Sudbury's best waterways. The park can be utilized 12 months a year and is a 4-season park including an extensive trail network for mountain biking, hiking, fat biking, snowshoeing and both classic cross-country skiing and skate skiing.

Canoeing, kayaking and stand-up paddle boarding can be enjoyed at Crowley Lake with portage options to Linton Lake – a truly peaceful oasis that is one of Kivi Park's hidden gems.
